Israel is Ours, Way Before the United Nations

In 1972, Former Chief Rabbi Yisrael Meir Lau met David Ben Gurion, the first prime minister of the State of Israel. The Rabbi's first question was to confirm a story that had allegedly happened in 1937. At that time the Peel Commission, headed by Lord Peel, was trying to decide a solution to the Arab-Jewish conflict in then Palestine. Ben Gurion was the last witness to appear before this committee that actually suggested canceling the British Mandate.

Ben Gurion spent over three hours passionately explaining the linkage between the Jews and the land of Israel, stating, "This is our home."

Lord Peel then asked Ben Gurion,

"Where were you born?" "Plonsk" came the reply. "Where is Plonsk?" "Poland."

A deathly silence consumed the room.

A Message from Rabbi Areyah Kaltmann - continued

Finally, Lord Peel said in amazement, "Very strange indeed. All or the Arab leaders who have appeared before me were born in Palestine. Most of the Jewish leaders who have appeared before me were born in Eastern Europe." Lord Peel spoke up saying, "Mr. Ben Guiron, these same Arab witnesses have a Kushan entitling them to this land (Kushan was an Ottoman land deed). Do you have a document saying that Palestine belongs to you?"

At that point, Ben Gurion took the Tanach that he had sworn upon while taking the oath to be a witness to the commissioner, and he held it up triumphantly exclaiming "Here is your Kushan, here is your document. It is the world's most highly respected book that you British also revere. This document states hundreds of times that G-d gave Israel to his people, the Jews."

Thirty five years later, Ben Gurion smiled and confirmed that this story was indeed true.

Then Rabbi Lau asked Ben Gurion another question.

"Imagine you have a document that entitles you to a land. If you crumple it up and shred it and then present it as proof of entitlement for a piece of land, do you expect the Peel commission to accept it in a tattered condition?"

Ben Gurion was a very smart man, so smart in fact that he refused to answer Rabbi Lau's second question.

If I could be so bold as to try to answer Rabbi Lau's question.

Israel is ours, as the very first Rashi or the Torah clearly states. We don't own it because the United Nations voted to grant it to us, but rather because G-d, the Creator of the universe, bestowed it as an eternal gift to His Jewish people. This September, if the United Nations chooses to acknowledge a Palestinian State or anything else, a far greater power has already proceeded with the declaration that Israel, in fact, belongs to the Jewish people. If Israel is ours only because we were granted it by the United Nations, then one day the very same United Nations can choose to give it to another people.

This very same document is what defines us as Jews and what has given our people the strength to survive literally thousands of years of persecution. That document has made us a loving, caring people where the average Arab in Israel has the best standard of living in the entire Middle East. When Turkey, for example, wants to demonstrate their compassion for ending a blockaded Gaza strip they dispatch a Flotilla to protest what they consider to be unfair treatment of civilians. Where are all the Flotillas and out pouring of concern for innocent bystanders who are peacefully protesting for democracy in Syria? But the same Jews who bear the brunt of "stealing" back their historic homeland always respond to other people's pain. Within the D.N.A. of the Jewish people is embedded concern for all of humanity.

Our Kushan, our document that grants us the land of Israel to our people is referred to as an "inheritance." An inheritance doesn't halachicly require its heirs to take any legal action, rather it is an automatic ownership that doesn't need what would normally be expected, namely an act of acquisition. However, we the Jews, should still not take our birthrights for granted and definitely should affirm it. When we, the Jewish people, do an extra Mitzvah, we show the world that this document is real. Even more importantly, we lay claim to an identity that is truly ours. Israel needs our good deeds, our prayers, and our acquisition. G-d can give us a gift, but the question is are we choosing to open it?

Far from being a musty, tattered old document, let's not only show the world but indeed ourselves, that our Torah has deep relevance to our daily lives.
