On the evening of Wednesday, September 4, Jews around the globe will dip an apple in honey, wishing each other and the world a sweet new year. Although this time-honored tradition is widely observed and cherished, many of us carry it out without asking, "Why an apple? Why honey?"

Honey is the easy part. It is the only food that will not spoil. Scientists tell us that if we discovered 1,000-year-old honey, it would be perfectly safe to consume it. So it would seem that honey, in addition to its sweetness, symbolizes longevity. We do not wish each other merely a sweet holiday; but rather the sweetness should last the entire year.

But what about the apple? Why of all fruits is it chosen for the new year tradition? An intriguing interpretation is that the apple is the only fruit that fully matures before the leaves of its own tree. Although the leaves of a tree shelter its fruit while it is growing, the apple forgoes this protection in a rush to become sweet and juicy. It has faith that it will flourish even if the leaves lag behind.

Our faith, like the apple on the tree, must be strong even in the face of so much global turmoil. Because we belong to a world community, we are accustomed to concerns about various trouble spots, but the current tensions in Syria and Egypt, ongoing enmity toward Israel, and the specter of a hostile Iran all combine to make the Middle East a focus of particular worry.

Nevertheless, on Rosh Hashanah we remind ourselves to supplant fear with faith. We trust that G-d will protect us. As we begin the New Year 5774, we ask G-d to answer our prayers that we and our loved ones will have a very sweet new year filled with faith, optimism, good health and sweet longevity.

May you and your family be inscribed in the book of life, health and prosperity. May you and your loved ones receive an abundance of blessings--blessings that multiply in a year of peace and freedom.
